HISTORIAN RETIRES

Alice Margaret Pitcher Blatchley was born on Christmas Day 1914, to Archie P. and Ellana G. Norton Pitcher. Her only sibling Phillip was a Methodist Minister until his passing in 1999.

The family lived in Maine N.Y. Her father delivered fruit & vegetables around the Binghamton area. Later he became the owner of a mill that ground flour and had a water powered wheel. This mill is now a historical landmark in Maine N.Y.

During her childhood Alice attended a one-room schoolhouse on Polard Hill, Maine N.Y. It had two doors one for boys and one for girls, double seated benches and no running water. This schoolhouse still exits in Maine N.Y.

Alice went on to receive a Masters Degree in Education from Cornell University in 1939. While teaching Home Economics in Poland N.Y., she met and married fellow teacher Robert Blatchley in 1941. He also graduated from Cornell University, receiving a Masters degree in Agriculture.

The Blatchley's relocated to Cortland in 1942 after Robert accepted a position as Cortland County 4-H Director. During his 30 years as director, he founded the 4-H Camp Owahta in Solon. Robert also served as the Town of Cortlandville's Supervisor from 1974 - 1977, past president and 30 year member of the Kiwanis Club and one of the founders and first president of the Cortland Antique Auto Club.

The Blatchley's have four children.

In 1979, Alice served as Sesquicentennial Committee Chairman and contributed articles to the Sesquicentennial Commemorative Publication. In 1986 she helped write and publish "Cortlandville Churches".

After many accomplishments and years of dedication Alice will be greatly missed as Cortlandville's Town Historian.


CORTLAND SKATE PARK

HERE COMES SUMMER !!!

As summer approaches, I would like to remind everyone that water usage usually increases between the months of May and September. Many things contribute to increase in usage such as lawn watering, pool fills, extra laundry, washing cars and taking more showers to name a few. With increased usage comes additional cost to the customer because the more water you use the more you pay. The customer can control this by monitoring their usage and using the water wisely.

As much as 30% of water can be lost to evaporation by watering the lawn during midday. TIPS:



Water before 8 A.M. or after 6 P.M and avoid watering on windy days. Water in several short sessions rather than one long one. For example, three ten minute sessions spaced 30 minutes to an hour apart will

allow your lawn to better absorb moisture than one straight 30 minute session. Only water when your lawn is thirsty. Overwatering promotes shallow root growth making your lawn less hardy. Make sure your sprinkler is placed so it waters the lawn, not the pavement.

FACT:

Toilets can account for almost 30% of all indoor water use, more than any other fixture or appliance. The most common source of leaks is the toilet. TIP:

To check the toilet for leaks place a few drops of food coloring in the tank. If after 15 minutes the dye shows up in the bowl, the toilet has a leak. **If you think you have a leak and need some assistance please give our office a call.

protecting ground water. Games, prizes, contests, demonstrations and tours will be going on through out the day. Individuals of all ages are encouraged to attend this once a year event.

TURN ON YOUR HEADLIGHTS! Workers and

around the work zone. KEEP UP WITH THE TRAFFIC FLOW! DON'T CHANGE LANES IN THE WORK ZONE! MINIMIZE DISTRACTIONS! Avoid changing radio stations and using the cell phone while driving in the work zone.
EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED! Keep an eye out for workers and their equipment.
BE PATIENT! Remember the work zone crew members are working to improve your future ride. STAY ALERT!

CORTLANDVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT

2000 was an extremely busy time for the Cortlandville Fire Department. We responded to 675 incidents resulting in 6,600 man-hours being expended on alarms alone. These hours do not include all the mandated state and federal training which the members are required to take as the general operation of the Department. The men and women of the Cortlandville Fire Department are very dedicated and work extremely hard to provide the utmost service to our residents.

Thanks to the overwhelming support from our residents, the Fire Department was able to purchase two thermal imaging cameras. For those who are not familiar with this technology, when firefighters enter a building on fire, there is usually no visibility whatsoever. Usually a firefighter cannot even see their hand in front of their face. The thermal imaging camera allows us to "see through" dense smoke and fire to locate trapped or unconscious victims, as well as "see into" walls to find fire very quickly resulting in less damage to a residents' belongings and property.

The cost for the two cameras was \$32,000.00. Thanks to your support we raised \$20,000.00 to put towards this purchase. The remaining money came from our savings account. The cameras were put in service in January of this year and have already been used five times.

WE ARE ALSO ASKING FOR THE PUBLIC'S HELP. When Cortland County switched over to using 911 as the emergency number to call for assistance, they also adopted the fire number for everybody's residence as their address. It is vital that everybody put the fire number on their house and both sides of their mailbox so that emergency responders can easily identify it. What currently happens is a lot of residences in Cortland County have two digit numbers on their houses. When you call 911, your three or four digit fire number appears on the screen at the 911 center, and the fire department, ambulance, or police are sent to this number.



sent to this number. When you don't have this number clearly displayed from all directions there is a considerable delay of our arriving at your residence.

If you don't know your 911 fire number or proper street address, please contact me at the fire station 753-9014 or at

home 753-6714. In order to guarantee the quickest arrival of help, it is imperative that you have this number

clearly displayed. Two DIGIT NUMBERS

ARE NO LONGER RECOGNIZED. Also,
please be sure you are using the
correct road name. A lot of
residents believe they live on Tompkins
Street Extension, West Road or McLean
Road Extension for example; there are no
such roads in Cortlandville. Tompkins
Street is Route 13, West Road is Route
281 and McLean Road Ext. is McLean Road.

If there is any uncertainty whatsoever regarding your address, please contact me immediately. Before it's to late, when you need us at 11 p.m., and we are driving up and down the street trying to determine which house is yours; because the correct number is not displayed or it is not easily seen by emergency responders.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

It has been a long winter season this year. We have gone over budget on our overtime and salt use by 33 to 35%. This will effect our 2001



year budgeted work. Our employee's have been working every day including weekends and holidays all season. Since December 18, 2000, up to March 31, 2001, they have worked daily except for the January 13th-14th weekend and February 19 holiday. They have been getting tired of snow everyday and are glad its coming to an end. I'm sure they would appreciate letting them know that they have done a good job of keeping the roads open for your travel this winter, when you see them.

As you know by now, the State Budget is late again this year. Our Government and some Legislators are trying to reduce the amount of tax money sent back to our Local Government (County, Town, Villages and City) to help with the maintenance and rebuilding of our local roads and bridges. This is tax money collected from fuels, licenses, registrations, truck-load permits and etc. Please write the Governor and your Local State Representatives to let them know that the current dollar amount sent back to our community from Albany in the form of Consolidated Local Street and High Improvement Program (CHIPS) money should not be lowered or curbed. If anything, it should be raised higher. We use this money to improve our roads and bridges so that we don't have to raise our local taxes higher.

* We will be doing some work at the new Starr Road Park site this year but it will not be open and ready to use for a couple of years. Until enough funds are available to finish the building and Park Facilities; it will take us some time to get it complete. We try to keep our budgets as consistent as possible so that we don't have a large tax increase. That means, we can only fund a little at a time. Donations are welcomed.
