Councilmen Testa and O'Donnell suggested putting together a newsletter—such as the successful and informative Village of McGraw newsletter which is published quarterly. BUSY TIMES FOR OUR FIRE DISTRICT AND FIRE DEPARTMENT

Excitement and work continue thanks to voter approval to construct a new Main Fire Station. Final floor plans are near completion and many new improvements will be evident:

- improved energy efficiency,
- a larger community room with kitchen,
- · easier access to all areas of the building, and
- · increased space for training.

Groundbreaking is scheduled for August, with enclosure of the building before cold weather, thus allowing work inside throughout the winter. Planned completion is for next spring.

The Fire Department will be conducting fundraisers to furnish the new building, so look for us throughout the summer.

Applications for membership are always welcomed. If anyone is interested in helping make Cortlandville a safer place in which to live and work, stop by the station on NYS Route 281, or on US Route 11 in Polkville to pick up an application.

COURT NEWS

Because of the Cortlandville Court's caseload and activity, it has been chosen by the NYS Department of Audit & Control to participate in its electronic transfer program which allows our Court to send its monthly activity report to the State electronically, by modem. This lengthy report, mandated by the Department, was previously hand typed and mailed to the State each month with a check for the total amount of monies collected by the Court. Quarterly, after audit by the comptroller's office, any money allocated to Cortlandville would then be returned to the Town for deposit into its General Fund.

Under the new system, once our report is received by the State electronically, they will then "bill" the Town for its share of the funds collected, and the Town will then forward a check to the comptroller. No longer will the Town have to wait three months at a time to receive its share; rather, these funds will remain in the Town's account, earning interest. In addition, the Town will be entitled to keep any interest earned on the State's portion of the funds which will be held in our bank account for several days each month. Considering the Court collected \$504,720 last year, this could mean significant interest income for the Town which can be directly applied against taxes!

We are busy with computer technicians and programmers, so please be patient with us during the conversion process.

The Court Office is open daily, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. from September 1 to May 31, and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. from June 1 to August 31. Regular Court sessions are on Tuesdays, starting at 1 p.m.



A SWIMMING POOL REMINDER . . .

With the summer heat, please remember that a swimming pool with a depth greater than two feet requires a Building Permit. Regulations for enclosures of pools, and exemptions, are available at Town Hall. For information, call 756-7490.



WATER & SEWER DEPARTMENT

The Town has two new concrete water storage tanks with a capacity of one million gallons each which gives the Department time for repairs if a pump should fail. The tanks are located on Blue Creek Road and NYS Route 215. In addition, we have two booster stations to supply water to those gravity systems which are at higher elevations—one for the Walden Oaks area, and one for the Cosmos Hill/DaVinci Drive area. These booster systems are run by electricity; therefore, if the power fails there could be an interruption in the water supply to those areas. Back-up generators are in place, just in case.




