





# **Town Board Updates**

- The 2022 Town Budget was adopted on November 17, 2021.
- The moratorium on large scale Solar projects is still in place. The Town's Solar Committee's review & recommendations for amendments are expected to be submitted to the Town Board in January 2022.
- The Town Board adopted the Comprehensive Plan for the Town of Cortlandville on December 1, 2021. The Town Board would like to thank the The Comprehensive Plan Committee Members and CHA for their hard work and diligence on creating this plan.
- The Town received a \$200,000 incentive proposal from New York State Empire State Development for Phase 2 of the Gutchess Lumber Sports Complex.

The Town Board meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of every month at 5 p.m. Meetings will be held via Zoom until further notice. Links to register for the meeting are available on the Town's website.

# Season's Greetings from the Town Clerk's Office!

Winter weather and holiday cheer means that the 2022 Town and County Tax Collection season and Water/Sewer quarterly billing is right around the corner. We are busy preparing the bills, which will be mailed by December 31st. If you have changed your mailing address or have paid off your mortgage and are no longer in escrow (huge congratulations!), please notify the Town Clerk's Office as soon as possible by email (townclerk@cortlandville.org) or phone (607-756-5725). Similarly, if you do not receive your tax bill after the 1st of the year, please contact the Town Clerk's Office. Per Real Property Tax Law, "the failure to mail any such statement, or the failure of the addresses to receive the same, shall not in any way affect the validity of taxes or interest prescribed by law." Also, as the Collecting Officer, I have no authority to reduce penalty charges – nor does any other Town Officer or Board.

## **Winter Tips & Reminders**

## **Code Enforcement Office** Sidewalks

It's that snowy time of year again! The Code Office would just like to remind everyone of the Snow Removal Ordinance within the Town. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the owner of any lot fronting upon any public street, alley, park or place within the Town to maintain the entire width of the sidewalk in front of the premises and street crossing access on any corner lot free and clear from snow, ice and other obstructions. Such removal shall be completed by 6:00 p.m. the day following the accumulation of snow or other obstruction. In the event of a continuous long-term snowfall and drifting of snow, removal shall be completed at a minimum of twenty-four-hour intervals. To view the full ordinance please visit the Town website.

## **Highway Department Snow Plow & Mailbox**

- The Town of Cortlandville has a no all night parking ordinance prohibiting parking on all highways within the Town between the hours of 1 a.m. and 7 a.m. from November 1st to May 1st.
- Approach snowplow equipment with extreme caution, slow down and keep to the right as much as possible. Do not tailgate plow trucks or sanders, stay back at least 200 feet.
- Do not leave snow on roadway or shoulders of roadway after clearing snow from driveway. Depositing snow into the roadway is a form of littering which may result in a ticket and/or fine.
- If you park on or near the shoulder, park far enough off the centerline of the road so snowplows and vehicles can get by. You should park more than 16 feet from the centerline or behind the mailbox line.
- Keep in mind, the snow from the plows will be thrown in the 10 to 12 foot area off the edge of a roadway. Nothing should be left in this area.
- The mailbox post and box must be strong enough to stand up to heavy snow hitting it from coming off the plows.
- Please keep in mind that hills where school buses travel receive priority. The Highway Department asks for patience during a heavy snowfall... we will be there!!!

## **Water & Sewer Department Cloudy Or Milky Water**



At least a few times a year the Water Department receives a call regarding cloudy or milky water. Although this does not look very appealing it's completely harmless. This is caused by air bubbles in the water and if you let it sit in your glass for a minute you can watch it rise to the top and become clear. There can be several causes for this. In the winter the water is colder and cold water holds more air than warmer water. As it travels from the tank to your house it warms up slightly. The air in the water is no longer soluble and the air separates from the water. Another cause is the water pressure. The water that feeds your house is pressurized by gravity from the elevation of the tanks. Water under pressure holds more air than water that is not pressurized. When you draw a glass from the tap it is no longer under pressure and the air separates from the water. The best thing to do is let it sit in an open container until the air bubbles naturally dissipate.

## **Recreation Commission**

Little known fact, that Town owns and operates five Parks. In addition to Testa Park and Gutchess Sports Complex, there are two parks in Blodgett Mills and a small park on Lamont Circle.

The Town Board has appointed the Town Recreation Commission in an attempt to be advised by people involved in sports at various levels. Members of this Commission include: John Folmer, Matt Coats, Abe Johnson, Machell Phelps, and Katie Wagner. Ms. Phelps serves as Secretary of the Commission, and its meetings are facilitated by John Folmer. Each Commission member brings a unique vision of sports in general, and individually offer different input as to specific sporting concerns.

The Commission's mission is two-fold: First, to advise and suggest to the Town Board ideas as to the services, programs, and equipment to be provided at the park facilities to make all of them publicly available and user friendly, and Second, to receive comments, concerns, and ideas from the general public.

At present, the Commission is dealing with three main concerns: drainage problems at Testa Park soccer fields, the addition of multi-purpose fields at Gutchess Park, and the creation of Pickleball facilities.
